In the past decade, several major exhibitions and scholarly publications have revisited many aspects of the distinguished career of American painter Philip Guston, FAAR'49, RAAR'71. Once known as "Abstract Expressionism's Odd-man out," a respected, but often misunderstood, member of the New York School, Guston is now celebrated for the magisterial figurative paintings of the late 1960s and 1970s. Combining painterly virtuosity and narrative power, they cast a long shadow over the current landscape of contemporary art. In light of the profusion of recent scholarship, the time seems right to take stock of the legacy of Guston's late work. Held in conjunction with the exhibition *Philip Guston, Roma* at the Museo Carlo Bilotti – Aranciera di Villa Borghese in Rome, this symposium gathers an international roster of critics and art historians to discuss the significance and critical fortunes of Guston's return to figurative painting, paying special attention to his life-long attentiveness to Italian art and culture.
