

Because he often changed house, he experienced many moves and was used to seeing furniture and objects packed, carried, and moved... just like in the painting Furniture in the Room.


Let's look for it together!





## Let's take a good look at it.

And there are also some other things
that look a bit out of place:
can you spot them?



Every time we move to a new house, we do not just leave the rooms where we used to live, we also leave behind the places and the people we knew.

But our feelings stay in our memories.

That's why, in this painting, besides the furniture, de Chirico adds a **rock**, a **broken column**, and a **small temple**. They all remind him of Greece, the country where he was born and where he lived as a child. It's as if his memories got mixed with the furniture, inside a


special room that lives in his mind.

## Did you find it?


Let's read the title together!
